Explore the Mayday Maritime Mile Treasure Trail

Take part in our Mayday maritime adventure that will get you exploring the most interesting parts of Belfast's iconic waterfront! Throughout the month of May, we've teamed up with RNLI to bring you an exciting Mayday Maritime Mile edition of the treasure trail, raising funds for the RNLI that will go towards the 10 lifeboat stations in Northern Ireland.

Look out for 9 special RNLI Mayday Mile panels at stops 1, 8, 9, 12, 13, 17, 18, 19 & 20. Rearrange the 9 letters to spell a word linked to the RNLI. Don't forget to take a note and email the answer to belfastmayday@rnli.org.uk for your chance to win a special tour of a RNLI Lifeboat Station plus a family hamper.

Using the map over the page, make your way to each of the 20 stops, uncovering exciting questions and facts about the Maritime Mile. The treasure trail will bring you along both sides of the River Lagan. Starting from City Quays, make your way past the AC Hotel Belfast and under the M3 underpass towards the Big Fish.

Cross over the Lagan Weir Footbridge and along the waterfront towards Titanic Belfast. Venturing down the Titanic Walkway you will see the Great Light and HMS Caroline with the final stop at the historic Titanic's Dock & Pump-House.

Don't forget you can jump on the Glider to head back into the city centre!

Heritage Facts



Belfast Harbour first developed in this area with small wharfs where merchants brought their goods. Now Belfast Harbour is one of the busiest ports in the UK, handling more than 20 million tonnes of trade each year.



RMS Titanic was
Belfast's most famous
ship. It was one of
the largest and most
luxurious ships in the
world when it was built.
SS Nomadic, Titanic's
'little sister', has many
of the same styles and
finishes on board.



The Titanic Slipways
are where RMS Titanic
and her sister ships were
built. They are now a
scheduled monument.
The deck of Titanic is
marked out, and you can
see where the lifeboats
and benches would have
been along with the
ship's funnels.



The RNLI is the charity that saves lives at sea. Its volunteers provide a 24-hour search and rescue service around the UK and Ireland, up to 100 nautical miles offshore. RNLI volunteer lifeboat crews and lifeguards are busier than ever, rescuing thousands of people and saving hundreds of lives around the coasts of the UK and Ireland every year. In 2019 alone, they saved 374 lives and helped over 38,700 people!

FACT 1

The RNLI was founded by Sir William Hillary in 1824. Collectively, the volunteer crew and lifeguards have saved over 143,100 lives since the charity was founded 196 years ago.

FACT 2

Lifeboat crew members have all kinds of backgrounds and jobs – from teachers to tattooists, farmers to pharmacists. In fact, only 1 in 10 of their volunteer crew members have a maritime profession!

FACT 3

RNLI volunteers spend many hours of their own time training together so they can meet the dangers and challenges they face on search and rescue missions at sea. They learn everything from navigation and engine repair to first aid and sea survival.

FACT 4

There are 238 lifeboat stations around the UK and Ireland, covering 19,000 miles of coastline, with 10 based in Northern Ireland.

FACT 5

RNLI are a charity that rely on the kindness and generosity of the public to power their lifesaving efforts, from the brave volunteers to donations, big and small.

Check the weather forecast and tide times before you head out.



Always tell someone where you're going and when you'll be back.



If you see someone in trouble, call **999** or **112** and ask for the coastguard.



Always carry a mobile phone and keep it on you at all times – use a waterproof pouch when going in the water.



If you find yourself in trouble in the water, try not to panic. Float on your back.
