

<p>Q: Where do I get the hop on hop off bus?</p> <p>A: Bus stop number 5 is across the road (Queens Road). Cross the road at the traffic light. They usually run every half hour from 10 to 4pm. They will arrive at the Titanic Quarter 5-10 minutes after departing from the City Centre. Visitor Services has daily updates on the times and languages they offer.</p> <p>You can book your tickets or buy on board of the bus.</p>
<p>Q: How do I get to the city centre?</p> <p>A: By foot: Follow the river, it will take you past the Nomadic and behind the SSE Arena. Cross the pedestrian bridge, cross the road and at the Albert Clock (leaning tower) go straight ahead into High Street. If you want to continue to City Hall, walk down the street and turn left at MacDonald's.</p> <p>By bus: the closest bus stop for the City Centre is across the road from the SS Nomadic. Take the G2 (Glider) to the City Centre. You need to buy your ticket from the machine at the bus stop before you board the bus.</p> <p>By car: we recommend leaving your car in our car park and walking or taking the bus to the city centre. However, if you want to drive into Belfast, there are many multiple-storey car parks. Drive down past the SS Nomadic. At the Premier Inn, turn right and follow the road. After the roundabout, take the slip road to your right. Once you have crossed the river, turn left for the City Hall or go straight ahead for the Cathedral Quarter.</p>
<p>Q: How long does the Titanic Experience take?</p> <p>A: The Titanic Experience is a self-guided tour that will take you about 2 hours. Add 30 minutes for the visit of SS Nomadic (included in your ticket).</p>
<p>Q: Is there wi-fi?</p> <p>A: There is free Wi-Fi throughout our building. The network is TITANIC Guest and there is no password. Please, note that signal is the strongest in the Atrium.</p>
<p>Q: How can I get a taxi?</p> <p>A: There's a free phone across from our box office to call our Taxi partner company, Value Cabs. The pick-up point is downstairs, -1 at the entrance of the car park.</p>
<p>Q: What else can I do around here?</p> <p>A: There is plenty to see and do in the Titanic Quarter!</p> <p>On a dry day, take a stroll along the Maritime Mile to explore Belfast's maritime legacy. HSM Caroline, a former WW1 vessel, is located a short distance from us, behind the Titanic Studios.</p> <p>A little further down the road, you will find the Pump House and Dry Dock where Titanic was fitted out. It has now been turned into a distillery – The Titanic Distillers – and can be visited. They also offer Thompson Dry Dock only tours daily. Booking is highly recommended.</p> <p>Walk down Hamilton Road (across the Titanic Hotel) for a closer look of Belfast's iconic cranes, Samson and Goliath (towards the Sydenham Road).</p> <p>For a family-fun day, why not head over to the W5, just a short walk from us? This science museum is a great educational place for people all ages!</p>
<p>Q: Can I eat my picnic here?</p> <p>A: Only food brought in our cafés and The Pantry can be eaten at our premises. There are some benches on the plaza and the Slipways where you can have your picnic.</p> <p>You can also bring your picnic to the Dock Café (just past SS Nomadic). The café is open Tuesday-Saturday, 11:00-16:00.</p>
<p>Q: What else can I do in the city?</p> <p>A: There are plenty of options for shopping:</p>



Victoria Square Shopping centre, Castle Court Shopping centre
Belfast City Hall is an iconic building, and the ground floor is open to the public
Free guided tours are offered daily on a first-come first-served basis at 11am, 2pm, and 3pm.
The exhibition on the ground floor is free. There is also a gift shop and a café.
You can find the Titanic Memorial Garden on its ground, on the East Side.
South of the City, you can find Queens' University and visit the adjoining Botanic Gardens and its palm House and tropical Ravine. In the grounds of the gardens, you have the Ulster Museum (free) where you can see collection of art, history and natural sciences.
Opening Hours: Tuesday- Sunday, 10:00-17:00. Gift Shop and café. No car parks nearby.
North of the city: the Belfast Zoo (High Season opening hours: 10:00-17:00 daily, low season, 10:00-16:00 daily; last admission 1hr30 before closing time)
The Crumlin Road Goal, opening hours: 10:00 to 16:00 daily.
Heading out of Belfast towards Bangor: The Ulster Folk Park and Transport Museum at Cultra, opens Tuesday-Sunday 10:00-17:00.

Q: How do I get back to the cruise terminal?

A: To go back to the Belfast Harbour, or the Harbour Estate Cruise Dock, it should take roughly 15 minutes by car or taxi. Due to the industrial nature of the areas near both these ports, we would not advise walking there from Titanic Belfast. Some liner services do provide a free shuttle bus back to the port from Belfast City Centre. To get there, you can get a bus connection to the Titanic Quarter by using the G2 Glider service, running continuously from Titanic Quarter. The Metro 26 Bus service also runs from Titanic Quarter regularly.

Q: Can I get an Audio Guide? What languages are available?

A: Audio guides are £5. You can purchase them at our box office.
They are available in English, Irish, French, Italian, German, Spanish, Polish, Mandarin, and Portuguese. The guide is also available in BSL and Audio Described versions.

Q: Is there a playground near here?

A: There is a playground near HSM Caroline.
There is another one close by, at Victoria Park (off the Sydenham By-Pass), towards Bangor.
Most parks in Belfast will have a playground.

Q: Where is good to eat around here?

A: There are a plenty of places to eat out, starting with The Galley Café or The Porthole (seasonal opening) for hot drinks, sandwiches and tray bakes or The Pantry for a hot meal or Hickson's Point (seasonal opening) for small plates and drinks, within our premises.
The Wolff Grill and the Drawing Office Two Bar will offer you some fine dining options at the Titanic Hotel, next door to us.
There are some eating options near the SS Nomadic: a couple of cafés, a Subway, and a Deli at the SPAR.
Please, note that the Dock Café only serves hot drinks and tray bakes, but you are welcome to bring your own food.
Further down the road, towards the City Centre, you can eat at Thyme, the Premier Inn restaurant. ON Donegall Quays there is Novelli's at AC Hotel Belfast.
Finally, the Odyssey Place contains several restaurants including Nando's, Zizzi and Five Guys.

<p>Q: Where is the bus stop/train station?</p> <p>A: The closest bus stop for the City Centre is across the road from SS Nomadic. Take the G2 (Glider) to the City Centre. You need to buy your ticket from the machine at the bus stop before you board the bus.</p> <p>The Titanic Quarter Train station is about 15 minutes' walk from us. At the traffic light in front of our building, cross the road to your left. Walk past the car park and turn into Hamilton Road. At the end of the road, turn left at the traffic light, and take the pedestrian crossing further down. There are stairs and a ramp leading to the platforms. The first one is for trains to Bangor, while the other one is for trains into Belfast City.</p>
<p>Q: Where is the nearest shop/supermarket?</p> <p>A: There is a SPAR, a small shop past SS Nomadic, at the bottom of the Arc buildings (after Subway).</p>
<p>Q: Where is the nearest post office?</p> <p>A: There is a Post Office in the SPAR. Its opening hours are: Monday-Friday 7:00 -21:00 (except Wednesday 10:00-21:00) Saturday: 7:00-20:00 Sunday: 8:00-20:00</p>
<p>Q: Where is the closest pharmacy?</p> <p>A: The closest pharmacy will be in the town centre, but you can purchase some basic first aid necessities and over-the-counter medication in the SPAR.</p>
<p>Q: Can you recommend a good pub nearby?</p> <p>A: You can get pub grub here at The Pantry, but if you can find plenty of pubs in the city centre. We would recommend the Cathedral Quarter.</p> <p>For a great pub experience, we would recommend a visit to the Crown Bar, one of Belfast's most known pubs. This pub is a great example of Victorian gin palaces and is owned by the National Trust.</p>
<p>Q: Where can I get Irish food?</p> <p>A: You can have a taste of Irish food here at Titanic Belfast at The Pantry. Any pubs in Northern Ireland will serve traditional Irish food.</p>
<p>Q: Where can I hear Irish music?</p> <p>A: Hickson's Point which opens on our plaza seasonally in July and August has live traditional music Friday – Sunday. Many pubs in Belfast will play live Irish Music, usually at the weekends.
